



our leadership development, training, and technical assistance support to JONAH.







CVV collaborates with other nonpartisan organizations to:


- · Train volunteers to assist voters with registration,



Dear supporters of JONAH (and potential supporters) -



we must be a society - and a country, and a world - of iustice.

To that end, our many volunteers and our staff put in long hours, extraordinary passion, creativity, and love, changing the systems that need to be changed. REFLECTION FROM THE JONAH ORGANIZER

The symbol JONAH represents, in my perspective, embodies the concept that **collaboration is possible despite our differences**. That symbol is what initially drew me to this role almost 6 years ago, and it's the reason I accepted the position. The reality of JONAH's commitment to this ideal is a significant factor that continues to motivate me. The potential for unity amid diversity is a profound force, perhaps more profound than we often realize, and it's the driving force behind our work.

Our primary focus is to foster a community that benefits all its members - where all feel they belong and are successful. As

former President Theodore Roosevelt aptly put it, "This country will not be a good place for any of us to live in unless we make it a good place for all of us to live in." We believe that working together, especially across divides, is the most important ingredient to accomplish this.

Many people speak of the importance of collaboration, yet some struggle to let go of their own visions or embrace the discomfort of listening to different perspectives. People tell me, "I can't work with this person because of such and such." Working with individuals whom we differ from can be challenging but it is the vital work we have chosen to undertake.

The difficulty of this work is precisely why we need each other. Our values of building relationships, promoting honesty, withholding judgment, acknowledging imperfection, offering support, encouraging personal growth, are part of the disciplines we seek to instill in our volunteers and carry out as leaders. This endeavor requires vulnerability.

Vulnerability, in my opinion, is where our power comes from.

Collaborating with diverse voices, beliefs, and approaches necessitates a willingness to:

- · Collaborate wholeheartedly,
- Acknowledge that we may not always hold the right answers; no single person possesses the universal truth,
- Recognize the differing beliefs of others do not invalidate our personal convictions,
- · Prioritize collective goals over individual preferences,
- · Let go of preconceived assumptions and biases,
- Embrace dialogue with those whom we may disagree,
- Continually foster new relationships.
- Honestly using your voice, yet learning to listen to others.

Corruption happens when there is an imbalance of power. To restore equilibrium and combat corruption, we must distribute power equitably, ensuring that everyone has a share. Regrettably, not all members of our society currently hold power. We define power in organizing as having the ability to act. Power also carries responsibilities, and we depend on one another to hold each other accountable. Power is meant to be shared.

What unites us, where we find common ground, is our overarching objective - whether it's compassion, inclusion,

community building, or problem-solving. This shared goal demands intentional outreach, deliberate inclusion, effective communication, a commitment to openness, and unwavering trust. All these aspects emerge from authentic relationships - getting to know people for who they are, one person at a time, and PRACTICING patience instead of anger.

Many of us are ANGRY at people who seem to be acting counter to our values. Anger is a valid emotion to have, and we must hold space for ourselves to feel that anger. But we must pause and reflect to keep it in check before we act if we want to BUILD COMMUNITY.

As Thich Nhat Hanh, wisely noted "Anger immediately creates a distance. When two people are angry at each other, when they shout in anger, their hearts are no longer close,

their emotions are divided and they go miles apart. To cover that distance, they yell. The angrier they are, the louder they shout. They are no longer in a mode of love, of acceptance, of proximity. They are unable to hear each other, shouting is how they believe they can be heard." I believe JONAH's mission could be summed up as "CREATING CONNECTION" (or "ELIMINATING DISTANCE").

I am convinced that true change cannot occur until we are willing to bring our hearts closer together.

LOVE is one of JONAH's values because we understand that loving our neighbor means loving ALL our neighbors. Love is manifested in close hearts, not distant anger. Love is something that everyone can perceive.

Our journey is one of hard work and learning from our mistakes. It's about extending grace to ourselves and to others. This process of growth, both individually and collectively, is how we will further our mission and vision. When we truly believe that every voice matters as much as every other voice, and strive to act from that belief, something powerful will shift.

JONAH'S INTERNAL CORE TEAMS

It takes a lot to keep a large organization like JONAH running! While our Executive Committee and our Board of Directors makes the major decisions, we have smaller more-focused teams of volunteers to support our operations. These groups are a great way to get involved in JONAH if you'd like to participate in general support over being on a task force. Read about these groups on the following pages!

The most basic building block of JONAH is the core team. Core teams can be built in member congregations or other organized groups. They are made up of a small group of leaders who work in their congregation or group to learn and teach tools of organizing, hold actions, and act as a conduit of information between their congregation or group and the wider JONAH.

To give you a better idea of how a core team can function, here's a partial list of some JONAH core team activities:

First Congregational UCC Core Team

- Held an August JONAH Core Team Golf Fundraiser at Hickory Hills Golf Course to raise funds for JONAH and for the work of the Core Team.
- Held JONAH Sunday on October 9, 2022. Activities included presentations by Core Team member Jackie Christner, JONAH Organizer Lynn Buske, and JONAH Mental Health Task Force member and author Larry Winter during the worship service. They spoke on the work of the Metal Health Task Force and the need for greater understanding of and increased services for those experiencing mental health crises.
- Worked with local organization Roundtable Revival to sponsor and assist with a Men's Mentorship program for men returning to the community from incarceration. The Men's Mentorship group, including three mentors from First Congregational Church,

meets twice monthly in Ingram Hall.

- Provided meals once a month for the Men's Mentorship Program and recruited other congregation members to help provide meals.
- Presented information at the June 4th worship service about the Green Bandana Project, a local initiative to increase awareness about mental health and provide resources and support for those with mental health issues.

Trinity's Strive Committee

The mission of the Strive Committee at Trinity Lutheran Church of Eau Claire is to strive to bring peace and justice to the church, community and the world. It launched in 2023 as part of Trinity's mission revisioning with the leadership of Lidixe Montoya, our deacon and leader of the Neighbor 2 Neighbor Ministry, and JONAHs' support.

Part of Strive's activities:

- The Caring for Creation Team seeks to expand sustainability and awareness through the church. They taught and led projects at Vacation Bible School. They are implementing compost services at the church and food pantry. They made green tote bags to reduce plastic use and raise funds. They held forums at church.
- Supported ELCA Neighbor to Neighbor Ministries who works to provide resources to Hispanic neighbors across Western Wisconsin.
- Is planning a Hispanic Celebration.
- Led an impactful racial justice workshop series and will do it again in 2024.
- Shares JONAH updates in the congregation and sits on the board. Use the church space for JONAH meetings, events and the upcoming Dead Horses concert.

JONAH'S INTERNAL CORE TEAMS

- Had a presentation about JONAH, and will do more JONAH topics in 2024, for congregation members.
- We are a Reconciling in Christ church and have a goal to internally work to ensure our entire congregation is prepared to live out that mission and be sincerely inclusive to the LGBTQ+ community.

Providing Trainings

JONAH's Leadership Training Team, composed of Joyce Anderson, Lynn, Buske, Perla Martinez, Paul Savides, and John Wagner, had another busy and successful year of training new leaders and refreshing "old" leaders through a variety of opportunities. A combination in-person and virtual new member training was held at L.E. Phillips Library, where 20 new members participated. Eight JONAH members attended a virtual 5-week WISDOM training series. Our JONAH organizer, Lynn Buske, trained new staff and interns, and the training team provided trainings at regular JONAH Board meetings. There were also individual and small group one-to-one trainings, member-wide meetings, and mini trainings held throughout the year.

As the Training Team looks at the upcoming year, we will again focus on our most popular and powerful training, "Building Relationships Through One-to-One Conversations." It is through holding one-to-one conversations that we learn each other's stories. We discover our neighbors' interest and passions, and we learn what our neighbors need to live and thrive in our community.

Other training opportunities will include WISDOM's 5-week training series and JONAH trainings on holding effective meetings and on developing specific actions around important issues.

New Leadership Mentorship Program

The Training Team is also planning a leadership mentoring program for those who wish to work their way into JONAH officer positions. Serving as an officer can seem like too big a step for many. Being mentored by an experienced JONAH member and/or former officer can make the journey to a

leadership position smoother and less daunting.

We need leaders with the skills and confidence to step up and get involved if we are to build the kind of community where all our neighbors can experience a safe, healthy, and productive life. JONAH's Leadership Training Team is ready to provide training and support for individuals, community groups, neighborhoods, and congregations.

JONAH Religious Leaders

The JONAH Religious Leaders group is made up of faith leaders in the greater Chippewa Valley. We meet for lunch and conversation monthly, at 12:30PM on the second Tuesday. Locations vary, as we rotate around to any congregation's space that chooses to host. All congregational leaders are welcome to attend, learn, and share.

In late 2022, the group discussed the focus and purpose of our gathering - who we are and who we want to be. In a great discussion, we discerned two paths: relationship for the sake of this group and relationship for the sake of the community at large. The JONAH Religious Leaders strive to be a supportive and educational group, learning from each other and supporting one another in our efforts for social justice. We additionally want to be in collaboration with the larger JONAH organization as catalysts for change, bringing a theological lens to issues in the community, and offering public witness.





This year, the group decided on a calendar of different justice topics for our monthly conversations. These topics included:

- Mental Health
- Racial Justice
- Addiction
- Creation & the Environment
- Criminal Justice
- LGBTQIA+
- · Aging & Dementia
- · Housing & Homelessness
- Immigration

Many in our group have appreciated this wide breadth of topics, since each diverse area of social concern has different community supports and opportunities available. Often, representatives of JONAH's various Task Forces or other pertinent leaders in the community are invited to join our conversation, so as to offer insight and further empathy for the issue. Our discussions have primarily focused on what each congregation is doing so that we might all learn new ideas and approaches to what can sometimes be challenging topics. We've learned how some Religious Leaders include these concerns in their preaching or how some congregations have dedicated staff or committees devoted to a specific issue.

This group is a welcoming and inclusive space. Over the summer, we have intentionally invited more representatives from congregations in the Chippewa Valley. Your congregation does not have to be an institutional member of JONAH to participate. JONAH's organization is committed to interfaith collaboration, and this group strives to be a place for interfaith relationships to grow. There's more than money involved with fundraising - it's education and relationships, too! We created social justice buttons to give out, and organized a social picnic event.




Looking Ahead

JONAH Communications Team

Much of what Jonah does depends on communication. There is the sharing of information by emails, articles, social media, posters and calendars. Talking with one another in meetings in order for tasks to be accomplished and plans actualized, that's necessary too. But maybe more importantly is the interpersonal communication we have with our neighbors in the community. Communication that helps us understand "What makes my neighbor tick? What's important to her? If their viewpoints are different from mine, can we find common values that we share and can work from?"

Communication is not only about talking, it is about listening, too. This summer Jonah offered a program entitled Civil Discourse. It involved the work of learning how to listen to our neighbors, how to hear their viewpoints for what they are, and to not try to change their way of thinking. It focused on talking with each other with respect; giving up our own agenda; finding the right questions to ask; and listening with empathy. When we do this we may start to think, "Is it possible I have been wrong about what needs to be done? Is it possible there is a better way that none of us have yet conceived?"

Most of us want to be heard, to be listened to. Let's continue to learn to communicate and listen to each other, so we can find ways to better our life in this community.

JONAH Rural Outreach Project

Chippewa Valley and Beyond

With growing awareness of rural needs after the pandemic, concerns about voter outcomes in rural communities, and 40% of JONAH followers residing outside of Eau Claire, JONAH formed a new Rural Outreach Project. In September 2022, two new Organizers, Kari Allen and Ken Hood, were hired by JONAH to focus on the inclusion of rural members across western Wisconsin.

Our team began with four goals: Listen, Learn, Empower, and Connect. We wanted to genuinely listen to the voices of rural residents so that we could learn their stories, strengths, and concerns. After building relationships with residents, we could then move into empowering directly-impacted residents for leadership within their communities and promote connections to local service providers, county resources, or people with pertinent experience as needed.



The Rural Outreach team held an event in Fairchild where 18 organizations shared the support they offer in Eau Claire county. This event helped catalyze the forming of a Fairchild Task Force!

Through one-on-one conversations, door and phone canvassing, and an online survey, we sought to specifically learn about top concerns, access to resources, and communication. Rural concerns remained clear and consistent throughout the project, with 23% of respondents indicating that Substance Misuse was a top concern, followed by 19% Mental Health, 12% Healthcare, and 10% Child Care. One Stanley resident shared their top concern, "Mental Health, because we do have a high population of low income households. Unfortunately due to lack of treatment, many people with mental health issues have less success financially."

Rural Mental Health

Through the WI Area Health Education Center we welcomed a public health intern for the summer. In just two months he held dozens of 1-to-1 conversations with people in the Chippewa Valley working in mental health and several Health Departments in Western WI, engaged with rural residents at their community events and listened to their stories, researched an updated list of mental health resources and support groups available to rural residents, and generated a list of grant opportunities for us to pursue to spread access to, and create more of, these resources.

His findings revealed that understanding stigma is the path forwarded. "it is incredibly important to collaborate with local organizations or even Churches in order to gain support and spread through word-of-mouth. Training itself is not as important as the act of going into these areas with the intention of developing a sense of community. Social

isolation is a major risk factor for mental illness and other negative health outcomes, and rural communities are often left out of the major

programming events or are unable to access the resources. Building relationships with rural communities works to connect rural residents who may have not been aware of resources available to them, but also works to destigmatize mental health by making it more visible in the local community".

We will continue to expand access and deepen support for mental health in small towns and rural communities, and are seeking grant funding to support this work.

Forward

A UW-Madison professor of political science, Katherine J. Cramer wrote, "We would do well to acknowledge that sometimes there is no substitute for sitting down with people and listening to their perspectives in order to measure what

those perspectives are." Rural leaders have a very important role to play in meeting the needs of small town communities. There has already been a shift in JONAH, where our Task Forces and general operations are being more intentional of including our small town and rural neighbors, and we intend to continue.

JONAH Book Club

The JONAH Book Club focused on the book "Nature's Best Hope" by Douglas Tallamy in collaboration with the Environmental Task Force and congregations. The Book



The Events Committee also organized a Community Involvement Fair, bringing the task forces together with community members interested in getting more involved. Seeing people talk face to face about what matters to them and seeing all the task forces together was powerful.

In alignment with the goal of providing more events to move

The committee also worked with the Fundraising Committee to organize the annual event this year. The event raises funds that allow JONAH to continue to operate and work toward justice for all.





JONAH'S TASK FORCES: OVERVIEW • AFFORDABLE HOUSING TASK FORCE

JONAH uses grassroots organizing to bring people in the Chippewa Valley together around social injustices, seeking to empower them to build a more just and healthy community for all. We believe in the principle that those closest to a problem or issue are best equipped to address it. JONAH connects people and serves to bridge them to solutions and actions to bring about change. We do this largely through our volunteer-led Task Forces. These task forces and the issues they are focusing on reflect what is important to our Chippewa Valley community. We currently have seven active task forces, which you can read about in the following pages, focusing on:

- Affordable Housing
- Immigration
- Transportation
- Environment
- Child Poverty
- Mental Health
- Chippewa Valley Justice Action Team



AFFORDABLE HOUSING TASK FORCE

Our work is well represented by Matthew Desmond, the author of "Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the American City":

"Decent, affordable housing should be a basic right for everybody in this country. The reason is simple: without stable shelter, everything else falls apart."

Our Task Force has focused on two primary efforts: providing leadership in the establishment of a Day Resource Center for those experiencing homelessness and the opening of the Eau Claire Tenant-Landlord Resource Center. Both have at their core, stable shelter being the anchor of a person's life.

Our efforts with the Day Resource Center led to the creation of Community Haven House Inc., an unincorporated nonprofit. We are a broad group of community stakeholders whose mission is to support and strengthen community residents facing the complexities of housing insecurities by providing day-time shelter, holistic services, and advocacy for collaborative, locally driven solutions. We are currently interviewing for a fiscal sponsor until we have sufficient funds to be an independent 501c3.

Our second commitment this past year has been the opening

of the Eau Claire Tenant-Landlord Resource Center https://ectlrc.org/ Our mission is to provide education, consultation and mediation services that promote positive relations between renters and housing providers. We aim to intervene early between tenants and landlords when problems arise before the word "eviction" is even spoken.

During an affordable housing crisis, it is much harder for everyone, but particularly low-income residents to find housing. Once they find it, it is extremely important that they maintain that housing, because finding new housing, particularly if they have an eviction, criminal justice history, or a bad reference from a landlord, will be difficult.

"One eviction can change the trajectory of an individual or family's life; multiple evictions can destabilize a community."

Moving forward, we will remain focused on our mission to to facilitate culture change in Eau Claire City and County so that all stakeholders are informed about the lack of safe, good quality, affordable housing and are motivated to take actions to address it through public and private initiatives.

Overview of the Problem

Poverty is caused by a variety of factors: low wages, high housing, childcare, and medical costs. It is well documented that race and ethnicity contribute to higher levels of poverty. The long-term toxic stress resulting from these factors contributes to families remaining in poverty from generation to generation. The high costs of poverty and, in particular child care, also hurt the economy of the U.S. by reducing both the work force and the GDP.

Western capitalism results in an extreme imbalance of family wealth, which significantly disadvantages the poor, making it nearly impossible for these families to grow out of poverty.

Impact of Recent Legislation

In the last century, the U.S. has passed a variety of legislation to help the poor but this legislation is both strictly targeted to specific causes and is difficult to understand and access. More recently, many public health experts have studied the complex causes of poverty and have proposed legislation that would provide more comprehensive and easily accessible aid to families. A version of this approach was implemented in the **CARES Act, resulting in an immediate almost 50% reduction in poverty.** However, the CARES Act family support funds were available only for the last six months of 2021, after which poverty again rose back to its pre-pandemic levels. In September 2023, the Census Bureau released a report that showed child poverty more than doubled in 2022 compared to 2021, resulting in another 5 million children living in poverty.

Conservatives and liberals both believe that families with children need better support. In the last five years a variety of bills have been introduced in the U.S. congress resulting in several congressional hearings but neither significant debate

nor lasting legislation. The Child Poverty Reduction Act was introduced in the spring of 2023 and is likely to be reintroduced this fall. This act would establish a more accurate poverty measure, and family support legislation that would help lift families out of generational poverty. Family support programs have been implemented in many other countries and have demonstrated, just as the CARES Act program, a significant reduction in poverty.

Call to Action

JONAH and WISDOM ask you to support the pending Child Poverty Reduction Act (H.R. 1558/S. 643). Please contact your representatives and demand they support meaningful discussion and passage of this act.

Task Force Efforts 2023-24

In 2023 JONAH's Child Poverty Task Force focused on three initiatives:

- Supporting the expansion of Badgercare in the state budget in partnership with several other groups. While the final budget did not include Badgercare despite countless stories of its need and the fact that it is free money provided by the federal government, the fight is not over. We will continue to fight for expanded Badgercare, as it helps families get back on their feet and stay healthy, with expensive healthcare costs, so they can be a thriving part of our community.
- Communicating widely the Childcare Crisis, advocating for funding for childcare providers, identifying the childcare gaps, and supporting the groups working to fill those gaps. Early childhood is a strong emphasis of this task force because we understand how Adverse Childhood Experiences can lead to the exact outcomes the rest of JONAH is working to reduce. Investing in our children is everything in building a peaceful community that works for all. In 2024 this will be our largest focus, as there are many complex pieces to the issue and families need quality, affordable childcare in order to
- Painting a Picture of Childhood Poverty around the state in a journalism collaboration with Julian Emerson. We have been working a long time on this project collecting stories and data. The challenge has been that there is much stigma around this issue and families often don't want to share their story. Additionally those struggling to make ends meet don't have the capacity to pause their efforts to survive to tell a story, which is painful to relive. JONAH JUSTICE ACTION TEAM

The Chippewa Valley Justice Action Team is a dedicated advocacy group committed to fostering positive change in the areas of poverty, incarceration, mental health care and understanding the intersectionalities that occur within all areas of our community

Our approach involves fostering inclusive and engaging discussions, along with exploring community-based preventive strategies that address the unique needs and resources of individuals who have experienced incarceration. Our ultimate goal is to shift our focus upstream, aiming to prevent the overuse of the incarceration system as a response to the unfair distribution of resources.

We do this by:

- Hosting community members from various sectors, including community organizations, non-profits, legal and judicial systems, healthcare, mental health services, the incarceration system, academia, and more. We aim to learn from their experiences and insights.
- Providing a platform for sharing ideas and resources, encouraging personal growth and mutual learning among our members, especially those who have been directly impacted by these issues.

- Staying connected to other organizations and advocating for vulnerable populations in our community.
- Being allies to those who have gone through different systems, listening, and learning.
- Working Within the Criminal Legal system to work towards systems that work for everyone and include all voices.
- Continue to work on projects to connect UW students, faculty and stories of EXPO members.

This year in our work:

- This year we worked towards advocating for a higher education in Stanley Prison with Odyssey Beyond Bars
- Peer Support in our community and the jails.
- A mural in Eau Claire that represents and is created by individuals with lived experience.
- Using Art As Therapy and Connection In Our Community.
- Our members spoke at the Correctional Health Care Conference and presented data that was done in this group titled "Returning To The Community".
- Community education around our group.
- · Working with our unhoused population.





"Who is an environmentalist? You are!"

Katherine Hayhoe, PhD, Atmospheric Scientist and Chief Scientist for the Nature Conservancy describes an environmentalist as anyone who lives on earth. It is fitting that the work of the Environmental Task Force (ETF) is to collaborate with residents and community groups on programs to educate and inspire us all to preserve and take care of our planet. This past year our work fell into two categories: waste diversion and promoting and preserving biodiversity. Waste diversion is simply defined as programs such as composting, recycling and single use plastic alternatives that reduce waste and divert it from the landfill. Biodiversity involves programs that support the web of life and natural habitats. Below are some of our programming highlights from 2023.

Earth Week Open House

In collaboration with Beaver Creek Reserve and the Eau Claire County Office of Recycling and Sustainability, the JONAH Environmental Task Force (ETF) hosted an Earth Week Open House at the Brewing Projekt on April 20th. Over 35 organizations engaged with 300 attendees discussing a wide range of topics from sustainable lawns, home energy audits, to no waste stores, composting, native landscapes, and much more. Plan to attend an even bigger 2024 Earth Week Open House at the Brewing Projekt on April 25, 2024.

Composting

Prompted by a recent Department of Natural resource (DNR) audit of Wisconsin landfills, which revealed that over 30% of the landfill is organic waste, the ETF continues to collaborate with the EC County Office of Recycling and Sustainability to promote composting throughout the community. In 2024, six more schools in EC County plan to implement composting programs. The ETF will assist with these transitions as well as promote composting at various community events and participate in outreach campaigns to educate about composting at home.

Single Use Plastic Alternatives

The plastic pollution crisis is all over the news, the ETF strives to educate consumers as to why single use is a problem and to provide practical alternatives. We will continue our community campaigns in 2024 to focus on awareness and simple habit changes that anyone can adopt.

No Mow May

One of our biggest programs this year was supported by an \$11,000 Pablo Grant. The grant was used to promote No Mow May. No Mow May is a campaign that several cities in the US and the State have adopted to inspire communities to rethink their lawn and leave a portion of it natural for pollinators to increase biodiversity. No Mow May extended well beyond May with several events throughout the summer. We promoted community talks and expert lectures; editorials; an art contest which had over 30 entries and six award recipients; and a number of citizen science counting and reporting events for flowers and native bees. In addition, the grant paid for the production and distribution of over 350 signs to homes, schools, faith communities, and businesses. The grant also is helping us promote the book, "Natures Best Hope" through book clubs and an author lecture on October 14th which are described below under Book Club.

Book Club "Nature's Best Hope" and Lecture

Our No Mow May biodiversity theme continued and helped support a collaboration between the Chippewa Valley Book Fest and the LE Phillips Public Library. The book, "Nature's Best Hope" by Douglas Tallamy was selected to be a feature book at the 2023 Chippewa Valley BookFest as well as the LE Phillips Eau Claire Library's focus for the 2023/2024 Community One Book One Community program. The library will be hosting the author on October 14, 2023 for a lively discussion on key points from the book. "Nature's Best Hope" is an inspiring read about each of us taking small, practical steps to support native habitats. The 8 key "next steps" that Tallamy highlights will be the launching point for the ETF's 2024 biodiversity goals.

Phoenix Park in Eau Claire was especially beautiful one Sunday afternoon this past August when the Chippewa Valley Multicultural Festival was celebrated. Why Beautiful? Because it was filled with the music and dance of Ballet Folklorico Mexico Azteca, Irie Sol, Second Generation Hmong Singers, and Ganna Ukrainian Dance Ensemble. People danced and children smacked candy-filled papier-mache pinatas with sticks. But most beautiful was the park filled with residents of our increasingly diverse community. For those few hours we experienced how we would like the world to be, instead of the divisiveness and fear of one another that often prevails. People ate food truck offerings, shopped, and explored the many varied cultural booths, and some even joined in a Hmong line dance demonstration!

Fifteen-hundred to two-thousand people gathered at this event organized by the JONAH Immigration Task Force, Eau Claire Area Hmong Mutual Assistance Association, Welcoming New Neighbors, and Visit Eau Claire. As Joyce Anderson, one of the event organizers said, "The festival is about neighbors getting to know neighbors and sharing our different cultural connections."

JONAH MENTAL HEALTH TASK FORCE

2023 has been a year of connection for the Mental Health Task Force. Our group has become more connected with our community and each other over the last year.

We launched the Chippewa Valley Green Bandana Project! We have been actively distributing bandanas to interested folks willing to pledge to support and listen to someone dealing with mental health challenges. When they take a bandana, folks are also pledging to speak up for their own mental health needs. These efforts have reached around 1000 community members across the Chippewa Valley so far. The Green Bandana Project has served as a way to express solidarity in the fight to end mental health stigma while strengthening our visibility in the community.

Several of us completed Emotional CPR training. It provided us with tools to help those in crisis including actively listening and holding space without judgment. The training compliments the Green Bandana Project beautifully. We are currently exploring bringing this kind of training into the community, potentially offering it to those who have taken the pledge, as a way to accomplish our goal of expanding the Green Bandana Project.

Our other focuses included advocating for peer support services both at JONAH's Issue & Action Night for mental health and the Peer Support forum held in November. Many of us feel that peer support is a crucial part of mental and emotional health. One of our goals is peer support expansion to help fill the waiting gap for mental health services.

More recently, rural mental health outreach has become a topic of interest in JONAH. The specific challenges in the rural communities regarding mental health have been brought up in our group. JONAH's rural outreach public health intern Aidan reported back with details from surveys and 1-on-1 conversations with the rural community. It is clear that mental illness exists in these communities in comparable numbers to urban areas, however, it is generally more challenging to seek help in rural communities due to access and transportation. Another barrier is the stigma that surrounds seeking help, partially because of an individualistic disposition surrounding adversity. Aidan's analysis included recommendations to provide mindfulness training to educators, work to destigmatize mental health, and expand peer support services. As a result of this research, we plan to focus more on rural outreach in the coming year.

We begin our task force meetings by checking in: "What is the state of your heart in this moment?" We share our own experiences in mental health with each other, so we come together to address mental health needs at an individual level as well as on a community level. We welcome you to join us the 1st Thursday of the month at 1pm and the 3rd Thursday of the month at 4pm in person or on Zoom.



JONAH TRANSPORTATION TASK FORCE - CHIPPEWA VALLEY TRANSIT ALLIANCE

2023 was a busy year for transit and public transportation in the Chippewa Valley.

Transit Center Updates

Construction work continued to move forward on the new Eau Claire Transit Transfer Center. An agreement was reached with the City of Eau Claire and Merge Urban Development Group based out of Cedar Falls, IA. The developer will build housing on top of the newly constructed Transit Transfer Center. There are plans to build 80 housing units. Half of those units will be affordable housing for community residents earning 80% of Eau Claire County's median income. The developer will pay the city \$250,000 to build in the space above the new Eau Claire Transit Transfer Center. In return the city will pay the developer \$5 Million if certain benchmarks are achieved. Construction will begin on the housing units in the Fall of 2023 and end in 2025.

Bus Fare Wins

On April 4, 2023, election day, the Amalgamated Transit Union covered the cost of free bus rides on Eau Claire Transit to encourage people to get to the polls to vote and make it easier for those who don't drive.

On April 22, 2023, World Earth Day, the Chippewa Valley Transit Alliance covered the cost of free bus rides on Eau Claire Transit to recognize World Earth Day and promote more eco-friendly transportation.

In April, the Chippewa Valley Transit Alliance Board voted to donate \$300 to the City of Eau Claire which is partnering with other community entities and individuals to support a free bus ride program for people experiencing homelessness. The City



is funding a portion of this program through funds received from the Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). This funding will be good for one year. Long-term funding subject for further evaluation and appropriation.

Access, Equity and Sustainability

On January 30, 2023, UW Eau Claire and Eau Claire Transit implemented extended bus service times for the UW Eau Claire Campus. Bus service hours were extended to 11:30 pm. UW Eau Claire students now have the option to use late night evening bus service to get around the UW Eau Claire campus and downtown Eau Claire.

National Transit Equity Day was observed on February 4, 2023 in honor of Rosa Park's birthday. The city of Eau Claire issued a proclamation recognizing the event. Eau Claire Transit promoted the event with flyers, displays and had roses placed on one seat of each bus running that particular day.

Eau Claire Transit has plans to phase out their existing bus fleet with newer more energy efficient buses. The Phase out period will run from 2024 to 2028 with modernization of newer style diesel-hybrid buses.

Bicycles

Wisconsin Bike Week Kickoff was observed June 2-10. CVTA and Eau Claire Transit promoted it locally.

Rails Coming to Eau Claire?

The Chippewa-St. Croix Rail Commission continues its efforts to develop passenger rail service between Eau Claire and St. Paul with various partners such as the West Central WI Rail Coalition. The Chippewa-St. Croix Rail Commission recently applied for a Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) study grant to continue its efforts with support from the WI Department of Transportation. FRA will announce grant recipients sometime in October or November of 2023. Amtrak is currently studying Eau Claire as a potential additional route service between Chicago, Milwaukee, Madison, Eau Claire, St. Paul, and Minneapolis.

Beaver Creek Reserve's partnership with JONAH has been and will continue to be a driving force for environmental awareness and understanding in our community. JONAH has been a huge supporter of our Earth Week Challenge and most recent campaign, Earth Day Every Day, as we encourage individuals and families to get outside and develop a more eco-friendly lifestyle. This past April, we partnered with the Eau Claire County Office of Recycling and Sustainability on our first ever Earth Week Open House at The Brewing Projekt. This event was a huge success as we welcomed hundreds of people and introduced them to green and/or eco-friendly businesses, clubs, and organizations in the Chippewa Valley. This in turn supports local businesses and families as they do their part to protect our planet. We are so proud of the growth we are seeing in our community, and excited for the continued partnership and environmental advocacy to come.

Citizen Action of Wisconsin

Previously office-mates and longtime allies, Citizen Action and JONAH continue to support each other's efforts in organizing on behalf of justice for the betterment of all.

Citizen Action of Wisconsin's Northwestern Organizing Co-op is working to build people power in the Eau Claire area and beyond, to fight for social, economic, and environmental justice. We have had a busy year organizing alongside JONAH on key issues like BadgerCare Expansion in the state budget, and have formed a BadgerCare Action Team to focus on advocating for the state to accept the federal Medicaid expansion funds, as well as push for a BadgerCare Public Option bill expected to be released this fall.

The Northwestern Organizing Co-op is just one of seven chapters of Citizen Action throughout the state, but we have been the most active in terms of volunteer engagement around key elections, and our top volunteers have been hired on as part-time Deep Canvass Field Organizers.

Epic Epiphanys


In 2022 Epic Epiphanys was one of 38 organizations who received an AARPA Grant to expand mental health telehealth services in the state of Wisconsin. JONAH was a big part of this telehealth expansion by partnering with Epic Epiphanys on Rural outreach efforts in multiple counties in the year the grant was gifted to us. Epic Epiphanys also became a member of JONAH Mental Health Task force to build relationships and conversations around mental health. We concentrated on those impacted by the criminal justice system to fill the gap in mental health and recently substance abuse and peer support services in the rural communities in Wisconsin. Through this collaboration we were able to establish Fairchild's Hope and Cope monthly event to bring resources, mental health and other wellness services to the community. We have met with other Rural coalitions to advocate for increased mental health, substance use and peer support services in Rural Wisconsin. We have been able to infiltrate the Eau Claire County jail to begin peer support services before the release of individuals incarcerated thus they have resources, and at times are set up with medical care, mental health care, and other wellness community based services in their area. JONAH has been a strong leader and supporter of this expansion of Rural wellness. Together we changed 100's of lives in the rural communities by bringing hope, education and services to areas that lacked it. I am so proud to be a member of JONAH mental health task force and a part of strong organization in our community.

Fairchild Task Force

When JONAH came to the Fairchild community they brought many resources/EC county people with them. Lynn gave a presentation on how the different County areas could help Fairchild. Jonah truly helped the community come together. Fairchild has lost a lot over the years and now they are pulling together as a community to make things better. Fairchild now has a Taskforce which involves 3 main areas, Seniors, kids, and drugs. Fairchild also meets once a month for Hope and Cope(providing Hope and learning to cope). Health Dept

The Eau Claire City-County Health Department and JONAH continued a long-standing partnership in 2023. Our shared commitment and focus on health and health equity, meaning everyone has a fair and just opportunity to be as healthy as possible, is more important than ever. Both the health department and JONAH know that some people in our community are not achieving the outcomes we want due to factors that are well beyond their individual choices.

Achieving health for all requires ongoing, collaborative, and community led work. We need to go "upstream" to impact the social, economic, and environmental factors that determine our health before the health issues happen. These factors are known as the social determinants of health and can include income, housing, education, transportation, and access to healthcare; some of our most basic needs. According to the County Health Rankings Model from the University of Wisconsin, we know at least 50% of a person's opportunity for good health comes from these factors, and are often outside of a person's ability to control. Personal health behaviors that a person can control, such as eating well and exercising account for only about 30%. All these factors together can greatly impact how long, and how well we live.

The mission of the Eau Claire City-County Health
Department is building a healthier community for all through prevention-focused programs and

partnerships. The partnership with JONAH has been instrumental in maintaining connection to the community to understand the root causes and barriers to improved health through the lens of social injustice. Our shared focus on addressing the social determinants of health and engaging the community around these efforts continues to be essential.

It has been a privilege to work with JONAH on some collaborative projects in the past year including:

- Mobilizing Communities for a Just Response Grant-Members of JONAH participated in the COVID-19 Community Health Equity Work Group throughout the COVID-19 response to improve access to services and information. In the last year, the group transitioned away from COVID-19 as the top priority and focused on creating a shared vision: "An Eau Claire where everyone has the power to have their needs met." To support reaching this vision, the group identified shared priority areas to best serve and care for all members of our community: increasing access, collaboration, communication, education, and maintaining dignity of those we serve.

The Neighbor to Neighbor ministry has been benefited by the relationship with JONAH. Together we have ben able to provide services to the Latin american community in the chippewa valley. JONAH has collaborated in the Neighbor to Neighbor Health Fairs for Hispanic families that connected the resources in the community with this marginalized population. At the same time JONAH supported actively the Neighbor to Neighbor scholarships for Hispanic students that has historically awarded \$8,500. JONAH also sponsored so a leader could attend a training on rural health equity, and is working with deacon Lidixe Montoya on a rural leadership conference in Stanley which will also be offered entirely in Spanish.

Roundtable Revival

Roundtable Revival is a community-based reentry program for men and women who are reentering society after a period of incarceration. Our vision is to bring everyone to the table to create positive and supportive, recovery and reentry solutions. Our mission is to cultivate inclusive, accepting, and empowering spaces with people who face barriers due to a conviction history: facilitating full reintegration into our community. Our first program is a Mentoring Program for men and women. Currently operating in Eau Claire County, this program will be expanding to Dunn County in 2024. JONAH and the Chippewa Valley Justice Action Team (CVJAT) have been critical partners in our efforts to support returning citizens who are facing the many challenges of reentry: employment, housing, transportation, health and mental health care, and recovery. 

Mental Health Pastor Patrick Patterson at Trinity Lutheran

During my time at seminary, I took a job in a locked mental health unit at Fairview Riverside Hospital. I worked the 11 PM to 7 AM shift. My job was to keep 16 patients calm and in their rooms throughout the night. I met a lot of interesting characters in my time there, and gained great empathy for their plight.

After Seminary, I served on a county mental health task force. Our job was to raise awareness and advocate for programs that would be helpful to folks who suffered with mental health issues. The chair of the committee ran a pretty loose meeting and sometimes ended up on tangents far afield from the agenda. As of Roberts rules sort of person, I would sometimes feel irritated with the lack of efficiency in which we conducted our business. John also worked full-time nights at a crisis center. This was a place that served folks who were experiencing a mental health crisis but did not want to go to the emergency department.

I got to know John better as we would have conversations about his work there, and eventually learned that he suffered severe mental health challenges as well. At that point my perspective on the way he ran the meetings totally flipped. I gained a greater appreciation for the challenges he faced in just trying to present himself as a "normal" member of society, and how difficult that was for him some days.

John lost the battle to mental health and died by suicide last year. He was a good man who not only struggled with mental health, he struggled with a society that does not honor nor support the challenges that he faced. We can do better, and we owe it to folks like John to be more accepting and supporting of the mental health challenges people face.

Dear God, thank you for the courage and persistence of folks suffering from mental health challenges. Be with them in those dark places, and bring the light of your spirit Into the darkness. Enable us as a society to find ways to better support and encourage those who suffer with mental health. Amen.
